Explore Elgin's Architecture Like a Visitor

Every year, visitors come to Elgin for tournaments at the Elgin Sports Complex, weddings at the unique venues around town and to enjoy all of the natural amenities Elgin has to offer. Whatever the reason is for the visit, they may find themselves exploring the diverse housing stock that has attracted residents from near and far to call Elgin home. You too can spend your weekend getting to know your city from the visitors' point of view, and summer is the perfect time.

Start your adventure by heading to the Elgin History Museum, located in Old Main—an 1856 landmark building. The museum has interactive exhibits that will have the whole family learning how Elgin became the city we all know and love. Residents can learn why some houses have stones lining their front walls or why some neighborhoods were developed with similar homes. Once you gain knowledge of how and why various homes and buildings were built, grab a map and start your self-guided tour.

Spend the afternoon exploring the Sears kit homes, award-winning painted ladies in the historic districts and even some downtown

buildings with a unique story. Most of these architectural treasures are within walking distance of the museum and can be enjoyed with a comfortable pair of walking shoes.

After touring neighborhoods, make sure to end your day in downtown Elgin, where its historic commercial district is full of architecture dating back to the 1800's. Situated on the scenic Fox River, a tour of downtown around sunset is makes for the perfect backdrop for photos.

Downtown Elgin also has a plethora of unique shops that you can step into while taking the tour. You can also grab a refreshment or meal at one of the many local restaurants. Consider planning your adventure on a Friday afternoon so you can catch the Downtown Elgin Farmers Market (see below).

Habitat for Humanity Programs are Great Resources for Those Needing Assistance with Home Maintenance



A Brush with Kindness (ABWK) and Critical Home Repair (CHR) provide minor and major, interior and exterior, repair services to:

- Prevent houses from deteriorating
- Address health, life and safety issues or code violations
- Prevent families from being displaced
- Protect affordable housing stock in our communities
- Ensure families live in safe, healthy and well-maintained homes

Both ABWK and CHR serve homeowners in the Northern Fox Valley service area who:

- Have household incomes at or below 60% of HUD median income
- Own (name on title) and live in the home as their primary residence
- Have paid their property taxes in full
- Have a fair cash value or property value less than \$200,000 (see tax bill)
- Have homeowner's insurance
- Are not in danger of foreclosure of their home and are not planning on selling their home in the next 24 months

A Brush with Kindness (ABWK)

ABWK is an exterior home preservation service that offers painting, landscaping and minor exterior repair services for low-income homeowners. Work is completed by groups of 10-20 volunteers under the supervision of Habitat for Humanity staff.



Cost recovery: As the scope of ABWK projects is limited (painting and landscaping), a flat \$100 is repaid by the homeowner upon completion of the work.

Critical Home Repair (CHR)

Habitat for Humanity's CHR program is designed to serve low-income homeowners requiring assistance with health, safety or code violation issues on the interior or exterior of their homes. Examples of potential repair projects include: roofing repairs, accessibility decks or ramps or mechanical equipment replacement such as furnaces and water heaters. Work will be completed by volunteers when appropriate, with subcontractors when repairs are more technical or require a licensed professional.



Cost recovery: As the scope of CHR projects is more extensive, a percentage – approximately 25% - of the repair cost is repaid by the homeowner. For example, if the repair cost is \$3,000, the homeowner will pay \$750 + 100% of the cost for permits. Homeowners will be informed of the repayment amount prior to the work starting and will have the opportunity to decide whether or not to move forward with the project. If work is authorized by the homeowner, one half of the homeowner's portion will be due before the work is started, with the balance due upon the satisfactory completion of the work.

Sustainable Elgin Community Grant

The City of Elgin Sustainability Commission (ESC) has a new grant program—the Sustainable Elgin Community Grant Program—to provide individuals and groups reimbursement grants on projects that work to achieve a more sustainable community and involve community engagement and/or education. Awardees will receive up to \$1500 for their projects, and applications will be accepted through October 31, 2021.

Any group of individuals located within the Elgin corporate limits is eligible to apply. Funds are available on a first-come, first-served basis this year.

The ESC will review and evaluate each application. The ESC will not fund more than 50% of a proposed project. Approved projects are awarded grants in the form of a reimbursement payment. Recipients will be required to complete a project report before receiving their final grant reimbursement to highlight the impact of the project.

Smoke Detector Program

Properly installed and maintained smoke detectors are the first line of defense during a fire event, notifying occupants of a fire while the incident is in its beginning stages and allowing people to safely evacuate the home or building. Working smoke detectors are not only extremely beneficial, but they are also required by state law.

Residents can now request Elgin Fire Department staff come out and install a smoke detector in their home. The fire department will install one 10-year, battery-operated smoke detector in a home that is owner occupied. To request a smoke detector installation, complete the form at cityofelgin.org/requestsmokedetector.

*Note: The fire department does not install hardwired smoke detectors. If you are looking for a detector to install on your own, please call 847-931-6175 to see if any detectors are available for pickup.



Fall Tree Planting Program

Elgin's tree planting program was developed to sustain our neighborhood forests and provide value to properties. Planting typically occurs twice per year, once in the spring and once in the fall.

Residents can request a new tree be planted by the City of Elgin in the tree bank, the area between the curb and sidewalk on most streets. Those interested can view the recommended species list and fill out the tree bank request and tree selection forms, both available at cityofelgin.org/treplanting. The application deadline for the fall planting is August 15.
