Winter storms and cold weather reminders

Winter storms create a higher risk of car accidents, hypothermia, frostbite, carbon monoxide poisoning and heart attacks from overexertion. Winter storms including blizzards can bring extreme cold, freezing rain, snow, ice and high winds.

A winter storm can last a few hours or several days, cut off heat, power and communication services, and put older adults, children, sick individuals and pets at greater risk.

Play it safe and take precautions when extremely cold temperatures are anticipated. Dress for the outdoors by layering clothing and wearing a hat. To ensure hands and feet are kept warm, lined gloves or mittens on hands as well as boots on feet are recommended. During extreme cold, stay indoors if at all possible. Check on friends and relatives to ensure that they are prepared, especially the elderly who may live alone.

If you, or someone you know, need a place to stay warm, there are several warming centers and shelters in the area. Information regarding shelters, resources and other cold weather considerations can be found at cityofelgin.org/coldweather.

Prevent cold weather water problems

During extreme cold, water pipes in unheated areas, or pipes located in areas exposed to drafts or open windows, will often freeze. Residents can help prevent freezing pipes by making minor repairs to prevent drafts, or heat or insulate exposed water pipes. If a pipe freezes, the problem can be resolved by gradually heating the frozen section of pipe with a fan or hair dryer. Do not use an open flame to thaw frozen pipes, as this creates a potential fire hazard.

During long durations of cold weather, a more critical water issue can occur. When frost is driven deeper into the ground, service lines carrying water to homes and buildings can become frozen. Residents with this problem should contact 311, as service lines can only be thawed by a professional using electric welders.

Help prevent this issue by running a small stream of water in a sink, allowing movement in the service line during those durations of extreme cold.



Keep your furry friends safe from the elements

Brr, it's cold! Your pets get cold too. Here are some tips to keep them safe during cold weather:

- Limit time outdoors or keep pets inside. Shivering is a clear sign your pet is cold.
- Bundle up! Coats, sweaters and even booties can help keep your pet warm.
- Wipe snow and ice from the belly and legs of pets with a moist rag to remove any salt.
- Prep paws: Clip long fur between toes and foot pads to prevent ice balls.
- Never leave pets alone in a car.
- Outdoor cats seek heat from vehicles. Consider making noise by banging on the hood or honking the horn before turning on and moving car.

In addition to a City ordinance, the State of Illinois also has an animal welfare law stating, "No owner of a dog or cat may expose the dog or cat in a manner that places the dog or cat in a life-threatening situation for a prolonged period of time in extreme heat or cold conditions."

When the flakes begin to fall, Snow Command makes the call

Every snow event is different. The duration and rate of snowfall, type of snow, temperature of the ground versus air, humidity and forecasted weather in the hours and days after the snow stops are some of the factors that come into play when developing a treatment plan for a snow or ice event. The City strives to keep the community informed of what to expect for each event.

Why is snow piled at the end of my driveway?

The primary goal of plowing is to remove snow from streets so that the road is passable for vehicles. Plowing pushes snow to the side from the middle of the street and in doing so, it naturally and unfortunately results in snow piling up in front of driveways. It is difficult to avoid this, and drivers cannot stop or raise the plow at each driveway. Residents are advised to wait until the plow has been through their road prior to cleaning their driveway and mailbox area. If drifting or more snow occurs, the plows may have to make multiple passes at a later time to keep the road clear.

When will the plow clear my cul-de-sac or alley?

In effort to get the most efficient use of time with City plows, their routes are restricted to streets. Cul-de-sacs, alleys and parking lots are cleared by a contracted private company that responds to calls from the City's Snow Command team, typically after two inches of snow has accumulated, and sometimes not until hours after an event began.

When does snow route parking enforcement go into effect?

Elgin's emergency snow routes are marked with posted signs, and vehicles are prohibited from parking on those designated streets anytime two or more inches of snow accumulates. Vehicles are not to park back on the street until 24 hours after the accumulating snow event has stopped. Avoid a ticket or tow by planning ahead for alternative parking options.

Why do I measure more/less snow than the City has announced?

As the official National Weather Service reporting station for Elgin, the Leo Nelson Riverside Water Plant is where measurements are taken. Variances in snow totals may be caused by many factors including blowing, drifting or even the fact that various parts of the city can have different snow totals.

Is trash collection impacted by the snow events?

If conditions impact Waste Management's ability to service residences, the City will post notices to its website and social media channels as soon as possible. You can always contact Elgin 311 if you aren't sure.

Is the City of Elgin closing school today?

Closing school is not a City decision. Please refer to your school district.

or snow blower





Packaging and other materials have changed significantly in recent years, complicating the world of recycling. In addition, the recycling industry has changed and only materials **free of contaminants** are recyclable.

Elgin residents have significantly improved their recycling through the Recycle Often. Recycle Right. program. You can help Elgin to continue to reduce recycling contamination by following these three simple rules below. Knowing these rules and putting them into practice will help you recycle more efficiently. And it will help to ensure everything that makes it into your bin finds a second life.



Recycle all my empty bottles, cans, paper and cardboard.



No foods and liquids.
*This means no greasy pizza boxes!



Empty recyclables directly into your cart. NO loose plastic bags or bagged recyclables.

Sign up now to participate in the curbside composting program!

Now is the time to purchase a subscription to participate in Elgin's curbside organics collection program. Weekly collections run during the months of April through November, in conjunction with the yard waste service.



Residents can combine acceptable organic food waste in a designated bin along with yard waste to reduce the amount of compostable waste in the landfill, and potentially save money on yard waste bags and stickers.

An annual fee is billed separately through Waste Management for this service. Residents have three cart size options at different subscription rates:

- 96-gallon cart: \$141/season
- 64-gallon cart: \$131/season
- 35-gallon cart: \$121/season

Any additional containers outside of the organics cart will require a sticker to be serviced.

To sign up for the organics collection subscription service, please contact Waste Management at 800-964-8988.

Did you know?

Recycling is unlimited.

If you have more recycling than can fit in your cart, additional containers can be used as long as they have handles, are 32-gallons or less and are clearly labeled "Recycling." Plastic bags and cardboard boxes are not acceptable collection containers.

Elgin residents who live in multifamily units without recycling service can still recycle.

The Waste Management Transfer Station has a designated container for recyclables.

No need to sort your recycling—it's a single stream container. Acceptable recycle material is that which is collected curbside in Elgin (refer to the "Recycle often. Recycle right." section above). Just drive up and drop off.



Residents can bring recyclables to the Waste Management Transfer Station, located at 1225 Gifford Road, anytime between 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday.
