Harvest water for your garden with a rain barrel

To create a more sustainable community, the City of Elgin has partnered with The Conservation Foundation and Upcycle Products, Inc. to sell rain barrels to residents. Rain barrels work by capturing rain water at the end of a downspout. Collected water can be used for house plants, gardens, lawns and more.

It is estimated that during the summer months, the average homeowner uses 40% of the household water in the yard. Collecting rainwater reduces demand for tap water and water use. Also "recycling" the rainwater results in less runoff that leads to erosion and flooding of stream banks, meaning fewer pesticides and fertilizer end up in our rivers and streams!

How can you get yours?

There's two options, and the first requires you to act fast.

Option 1: Pre-order for the Rain Barrel Pickup Event (and avoid delivery fees).

Visit cityofelgin.org/rainbarrel and place your order by May 4, and you can pick it up on Friday, May 6 at Hawthorne Hill Nature Center, located at 28 Brookside Drive.

Option 2: Order anytime at cityofelgin.org/rainbarrel to have a rain barrel delivered to you.

Upcycle Products, Inc. also sells other garden accessories, like rain barrel pedestals, composters (stationary and tumbling), hoses and more.

No roof. No problem.

Receive guaranteed savings on your electric bill and support solar development in Illinois by enrolling in the City-sponsored Community Solar Program.

Residents can reduce their monthly electric bills without installing solar panels on their homes, and instead, enrolling in Elgin's Community Solar Program. Those who subscribe to the program receive credits on their ComEd accounts for renewable energy generated on a solar farm in Illinois, and these credits reduce the energy supply charges on monthly energy bills.

Signing up

Electricity generated from solar flows into the grid, blending with electrons generated from all energy sources (wind, fossil fuel, nuclear, etc.) to power homes and businesses.

Severe weather safety

Severe weather can strike at anytime. Ensure you have weather safety procedures at home, work, school, place of worship, on the road and elsewhere.

Have a severe weather safety plan for your family. Pick a spot to shelter in the home, such as a basement or interior room. Know how to reach each other, and have a meeting spot if you get separated.

To stay informed during a severe weather event, it's recommended to have multiple ways to receive alerts. Make sure you have wireless emergency alerts enabled on your smartphone, a battery-powered radio, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) weather radio, TV and/or internet.

Know the difference between a "Watch" and a "Warning" and what to do during each scenario.

Watch: *Be prepared!* Severe storms or tornadoes are possible in your area. Be alert and monitor information. Review and discuss your emergency plans and check supplies and your safe room. Be ready to act quickly if a warning is issued. Acting early helps to save lives.

Warning: *Take action!* Severe weather has been sighted or indicated by radar. There is imminent danger to life and property. Move to an interior room or the lowest level of a sturdy building. Avoid windows. If in a mobile home, a vehicle or outdoors, move to the closest substantial shelter and protect yourself from flying debris.

Power Outages

Severe weather can take down limbs and power lines, leaving you without power. It's important to be prepared for such a situation. Those with special needs, such as those who may be elderly, disabled or dependent on electricity for medical equipment, should have alternate arrangements in place should they experience an extended power outage. Downed branches and trees

Following severe weather, it's common to see downed branches and trees. Here's what to do depending on the situation:

- Call the Elgin Police Department if there is an immediate danger involving power lines, limbs over houses or if the tree is blocking a street or driveway (847-289-2700 or 911).
- Generally speaking, trees that are between the sidewalk and street, or ones that are located at City-owned properties, are considered public trees. If one of these has fallen, then please call 311 or email elgin311@cityofelgin.org, noting the location (nearest address or intersection) of the tree or limb.
- Trees growing on private property are the responsibility of the property owner. If a tree or large limb growing from private property falls, contact a professional tree service for assistance in removal. If it's a small amount, remember you can always bundle branches for free collection by Waste Management. Just make sure bundles are tied, no longer than 5 feet, branches are less than 2 inches in diameter and bundles weight less than 45 pounds each.



Have the following items on hand in case of a power outage:

- Flashlights, not candles.
- Fresh batteries.
- Battery-operated clock radio.
- Fully-charged cell phone.
- Non-perishable foods.
- Water: one gallon/person/day without electric service.
- Blankets.
- A list of emergency phone numbers.
